





# CLPOA Executive's Message



I am Dave Taillefer, your current CLPOA President, and I am delighted to share a few reflections and updates with you.

While growing up in Peterborough, I had only been exposed to the cottage lifestyle through the occasional invite from a school or family friend, however, those

memories stuck with me and I always had a goal that I would own a cottage one day. This goal led to fruition in 1999, when I, my sister and our parents bought a family cottage and from that day forth I fell in love with the lake. Chandos Lake has become an integral part of my life, vying for attention along with my family. While my wife and kids hold the top spots, the lake's magic often challenges that order.

While I do believe that the love of Chandos Lake is a shared attribute of all members, I also believe that lake life and owning a shared cottage has taught me some valuable life lessons.

After our first year on the lake, we decided to purchase our first motorboat. Being a new boater I learned very quickly (on the first day) that if one is not familiar with the lake, you should wait till the hazard buoys are placed before launching your boat. Later, I also learned that once they are placed then one should remain a safe distance away. These were two different expensive lessons to learn but valuable ones and stories that I pass onto my kids so that, hopefully, they don't have to learn from the experiences as I did. I also came to love the camaraderie of the boating community, whether it be helping an inexperienced boater with docking at the marina, or with everyone waving to each and every boater that passes. Although I did also learn that when the people on the docks are waving at me with only one finger or have a scowl on their face, it may be best to not only look out in front of the boat, but equally important to look behind and be aware of the wake you may be leaving. I am glad to share that in the 20 plus years on the lake, I have become a much better boater.

When we first came to the lake, I had a beloved dog that was very sensitive and afraid of fireworks. I also had a family member who loved nothing more than hearing the thunderous booms and watching the sparkles every weekend. In understanding the two perspectives, communicating and coming to a compromise was important. It included both limiting the usage of fireworks, and compromising on when we would be there and/or when they would be lit. When the CLPOA,

in 2017, decided to start having a large Firework Show on the Civic long weekend, we no longer felt it was necessary to light off individual fireworks, but rather it was preferable to wait for the big show. I have also noticed fewer and fewer individual fireworks present on the lake, with the community all enjoying the spectacular event hosted by the CLPOA.

Nights around the campfire is soothing for the soul, a time to refresh, a time for laughter and all around a wonderful way to spend an evening. That is why the fire ban throughout the province in the summer of 2023 was so difficult for many, and taught us that being conscious of fire safety should be paramount for all. Cottage life for me equates into bonfires. While great for socialization, one does also have to be aware that sound does travel a long distance over water, even to the people on the other side of the lake. The sounds of your campfire sing-alongs, though appreciated, could perhaps diversify beyond only the familiar choruses of "Sweet Caroline" and "American Pie".

Waking up by jumping in the lake, cooling down after an afternoon of chores (or drinks on the dock) or having one final dip before bedtime and it doesn't matter if you wade in or jump in with reckless abandon, the lake seems magical in its powers to heal, reinvigorate, calm or energize. There's just something about being on or in the lake that makes you appreciate just how lucky we are to be in such a beautiful place. Please appreciate the lake and the environment while we still have it, and do everything we can to protect it.

Our community thrives on fun and family events, such as the Kids' Fishing Derby, the Regatta on the Civic long weekend, the Corn and Wiener Roast, the Fireworks Show on the Civic long weekend, Canoe and Kayak Day and the Chandos Lake Sailing Club races led by dedicated individuals like Lynne Moore, UE Kosar, Shantelle Bisson, Derek Hull, Iain Gorman, and Paul Walkovich. Many of these events are hosted by our Marina Partners, Lakeview Cottages & Marina, Gilmour Bay Marina and Shantilly's Place. There are few things in life that can trump the laughter of children, the awe of fireworks, the peacefulness of a paddle on a quiet lake or the competitive spirit of a race against friends. We welcome everyone to be a part of some or all of the events and activities the CLPOA can offer.

I would be remiss to not to express deep gratitude to retiring board members. Alan Bird, who stood as President of the CLPOA prior to me, and most recently completed his one year term as Past President, thank you for all of your insight and advice. I have always greatly appreciated being able to rely on your knowledge and fair viewpoints. Lyn Turnbull, as our VP Membership, you have done a wonderful job as an executive member and assisted with any project

or question that has arisen. Craig Morrison who led our communication team and we've all received the thoughtful newsletters and emails from Craig who was our primary link to the valuable insight and thoughts brought forth from our members. Tania Rightmyer, who assisted with the Fireworks Show and Fishing Derby as the board liaison, was thoughtful in her comments and suggestions and always willing to lend a hand or offer her perspective on issues. And finally, a huge thank you goes out for all of the years of hard work that Edith Gorman has put into the CLPOA Yearbook. This publication has grown with not only the quantity of pictures but the overall quality under her guidance. Thankfully we have already secured some enthusiastic volunteers who are assisting with this publication to learn everything they can from Edith.

As I have just pointed out, we do have some board members who are stepping down, and we feel that board renewal is very important to not only share the work but also to cultivate new ideas and initiatives.

Everyone working with the CLPOA is a volunteer! These people give countless hours of their time to work to make Chandos Lake a wonderful place to call home or a weekend home for many. These volunteers help to keep the costs down to as minimal as possible so please lend a helping hand or volunteer when a project comes up. The association is lucky and very thankful to have volunteers outside of the executive who use their time for environmental projects, to assist with CLPOA events, to put in and take out the hazard buoys and so

on. We encourage others to reach out and assist with all of these activities to allow future generations to have shared memories of our lake and events.

I also want to thank our business partners on the lake. We are very fortunate to have three different Marinas on the lake who are a vibrant part of our community, whether it be hosting events, gassing or repairing our boats or the most important feature – serving us ice cream. We thank you for being a part of the CLPOA and the Chandos Lake Community.

Finally, I want to thank you, the member. We would not be able to do what we do without you and your participation in the CLPOA. I would also like to encourage you to talk to your friends and neighbours on the lake to see if they are CLPOA members or volunteers. We currently represent about 650 cottagers on the lake and this is a bit over 50% of the properties. Given what the CLPOA does for water safety, boater safety, the environment and the events for the young and more experienced, we feel that the investment is well worth it. Let us encourage our friends and neighbours to join the association, ensuring a united effort to preserve and enhance our beloved Chandos Lake.

He enjoyed many summers at the lake with family and friends, always entertaining over long weekends with tunes playing on the screened-in porch.



# Mayor's Message



As your Mayor, CAROLYN AMYOTTE, I am pleased to provide another municipal update for the 2024 CLPOA Yearbook.

This past year we experienced some staffing changes and a great loss. Long time Parks and Rec employee and former volunteer firefighter, Alex

Anastasiou passed away in the spring. We held a Fire Department procession in his honour. Alex left a hole in our hearts and we miss him. This fall we welcomed Shawn Tucker (formerly our Tech Services Director of the North Kawartha Library), into our Parks and Rec family and saw Kim Tucker promoted to Shawn's former position in our Library. We also recognized several staff members for their long-standing service to our community. Five-year service awards were presented to Deputy Fire Chief Ryan Lye, Finance Assistant and IT Coordinator Mackenzie Sykes, Public Works Operators Jason Nottage and Kyle White, and a 25-year award was presented to Equipment Operator Randy Woods.

Although we often refer to our 'new' municipal buildings it is important to note that many are now over 10 years old, some are approaching 20 years and one is nearly 100 years old! Things like new roofs, renovating the Glen Alda Community Centre, recovering the Sand Dome, maintaining the arena and ice equipment and much more took place over this past year. Another exciting revitalization project is the cleanup and reopening of Riverview Park in Apsley. Next steps will include a master planting plan, signage, benches, tables and washrooms. Since touring our roads this past September, Council has also endorsed a five-year plan to surface treat our gravel roads. These improvements have already been completed on several roads in the southern part of our Township.

We have continued to work with our government partners through projects like additional parking at the Long Lake entrance into the Kawartha Highlands Provincial Park. I am very pleased to say that it has been over a year since Community Safety Zones were designated on Highway 28 and we have seen improvements in highway safety. While we didn't receive any disaster relief assistance for the damage done by the Derecho storm of May 2022, we did receive one-time funding from the MNRF to support the continued clean up this past summer. We also joined the Health

Canada initiative 'Take Action on Radon' and provided free test kits for residents to participate in the program and raise awareness about this issue. With our continued focus on community safety, Council also completed a Community Risk Assessment, to ensure we are planning and preparing for the future.

Each year Council supports a variety of events and local organizations and 2023 was no exception. Council provided support to Bancroft Hospital's 'Back the Cat' Campaign to bring a CT Scanner to our region. We donated to the Apsley Feral Cat Outreach to support the spaying and neutering of local feral cats. The Township also worked closely with two of our local lake associations in the fight against invasive aquatic species. First, we officially launched a boat cleaning station at Chandos Lake Boat Launch in partnership with the CLPOA. We also endorsed the Big Cedar Lake Stewardship Association application for a DFO grant to set up these cleaning stations throughout our municipality.

Like many communities, we are looking at ways to increase our attainable housing supply. We applied to the federal Housing Accelerator Fund. We also support Peterborough County's further research into Communal Servicing options for rural communities like ours. Related to housing, Short-Term Rentals is another hot topic. Council has created a Short-Term Rental Advisory Committee to investigate the impacts to our community and provide recommendations.

I enjoy doing these annual updates as it gives me a moment to reflect on the past and see all the good things that took place. However, my update this year would not be complete without highlighting two specific accomplishments: Our Inaugural Joint Council meeting with the Townships of Selwyn, Trent Lakes and Curve Lake First Nation, and the creation of our new Township Brand and tagline. Meeting with our neighbours including our First Nation neighbours helps us to build friendships and create collaborative opportunities between our communities. Attending that meeting I felt so aligned with our new municipal tagline or what I like to think of as our purpose: 'Connecting Community, Nature and Spirit'. As always it is an honour and a pleasure to serve as your Mayor and I look forward to creating more positive connections and change in 2024.

#### **CLPOA TREASURER'S REPORT**

The 2024 Yearbook includes Statements of Income for 2023, the Budget for 2024, the Balance Sheet as at December 31, 2023, the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended 2023 and a report from Rafiq Dosani, the accountant who carried out the review of these financial statements.

In 2023 the CLPOA had an operating surplus of \$23,667. Revenue increased by \$10,079 compared to 2022 due to better than anticipated advertising sales and interest income. All CLPOA programs were delivered on or under budget. Boat Cleaning Station expenses were covered in the previous year. A major Environmental Issues project was postponed until 2024 and the Yearbook pickup program was reinstated, saving significantly on postage.

Expenses totaled \$53,450 which was \$47,005 less than 2022. 2022 expenses were unusually high due to the purchase of the Boat Cleaning Station.

The Environmental Reserve Fund, established in 2017, remains at \$50,000.

Our year-end cash position remains strong at \$132,750 which is primarily held in interest-bearing, short-term investments. Current Liabilities, including Deferred Revenue from prepaid future membership fees totaled \$27,577 compared to \$27,625 on December 31, 2022.

Our 2023 budget forecasts a small operating deficit of \$2,500. Due to our 2023 year-end results, combined with our healthy surplus, the Association does not anticipate a need increase in Membership Fees at this time.

After many years of service to the CLPOA, including her time on the board and as our bookkeeper, Julie Smith is stepping down from her official duties. Many thanks to Julie for her support to Chandos Lake. I am pleased to announce that Jeff Franks is taking over the bookkeeping duties. If you see him out tackling the water ski course on South Bay please give him a wave of thanks

Rafiq Dosani, CPA, CA has again this year provided the official review of our financial statements at no charge. Rafiq's contribution to making our Association work is so very much appreciated.

Many more volunteers are involved in the large variety of wonderful programs and activities run by the Association. Many thanks to each and every one of our amazing volunteers – we couldn't do it without you!

Many volunteers are involved in efforts to assess our lake's health and raise awareness of how our actions impact our treasured Chandos Lake!



Community Science in Support of Lake Health

Each summer season, the CLPOA participates in water testing programs designed to monitor and support the ongoing health of Chandos Lake.

Our volunteers play a critical role in these community science endeavours. In 2023, three such programs were conducted on the lake. IsampleON which tested water samples for the presence of certain invasive aquatic plants, Trent University's Aquatic Research Program, coordinated through NORKLA, which monitors clarity, temperature, chlorophyll, etc. and the Lake Partner Program. Descriptions of these three longstanding programs on our lake were set out in more detail in last year's Yearbook report. This year, we'll focus on the LPP and what its test results have shown us.

#### **Lake Partner Program**

The LPP is a volunteer-based inland lakes water quality monitoring program.

In partnership with the Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Associations (FOCA) and operated from the Dorset Environmental Science Centre in Muskoka, it has been collecting data from water samples and clarity readings taken by volunteers since 1996. Such data is key to understanding and protecting lake health.

Thanks to a dedicated group of volunteers, the CLPOA has been able to submit samples and readings to the LPP from its outset. This consistent participation has enabled the LPP to compile a detailed Lake Data Report for Chandos Lake, issued to us just recently. The report has a specific focus on results for the past five years and compares Chandos Lake indicators to those of other participating lakes in the Canadian Shield. Here are a few interesting takeaways from the report:



Water Clarity - Based on Secchi disc readings taken from May to September each year, Chandos Lake has had a higher average clarity than the majority of similar lakes. Our readings since 1996 have been relatively stable and consistently above the median range, so let's work hard to keep them that way!

Phosphorous - Although an essential element for aquatic systems, elevated phosphorous can decrease water clarity and deep water oxygen concentrations and promote the growth of algae. Total phosphorous readings for Chandos Lake classify it as a low production, 'oligotrophic' (clear and cold) lake, with concentrations consistently well below the provincial Water Quality Objective level.

Chloride - Another essential element for freshwater ecosystems, but one which in elevated concentrations can be toxic to aquatic organisms. Road salt entering lake watersheds increases chloride levels. Measured since 2015, the chloride levels in Chandos Lake have remained relatively stable, at slightly above the average for similar Shield lakes.

**Calcium** - An important nutrient for lake dwelling organisms, it can be decreased by factors such as acid rain and deforestation. Chandos Lake calcium readings are in the high range for similar lakes and well above the threshold at which sensitive aquatic species might be at risk.

Ontario's inland lakes are complex ecosystems and many factors affect their health. See the FOCA website page Healthy Shorelines and Lake Stewardship for a fuller discussion of this topic.

#### Chandos Lake Waterless Boat Cleaning Station Update

In early 2022, the CLPOA Board of Directors approved the purchase of a CD3 Waterless Boat Cleaning System in conjunction with the Township of North Kawartha.

The purpose of this unit is to allow boaters entering and leaving Chandos Lake to follow these environmentally important steps - Clean, Drain, Dry and Dispose.

This reduces the possibility of invasive species entering our lake and those lakes around us.

The solar powered CD3 unit was installed at the Public Launch on Highway 620 in May 2023. The unit has user friendly operating instructions and each cleaning process should take a boater no more than five minutes. In addition, the Township has installed signage and garbage containers.

The grand opening was on June 19th. Attendees from Chandos Lake and several neighbouring lakes, local and regional politicians and staff, representatives from ISAP and FOCA, listened to welcoming words from the CLPOA President, Dave Taillefer, and North Kawartha

Mayor, Carolyn Amyotte. Mayor Amyotte led a spirited demonstration of the boat cleaning station in action.

## New Speed/Low Wake Signs for Gilmour Bay Narrows

Boaters and cottagers along the Gilmour Bay Narrows will be pleased to know that the CLPOA will be replacing the two old and badly deteriorated floating 10 km/h signs this summer season.

The design of the new signs is not yet available, but our goal is for them to include appropriate wording re low wakes as well as the speed limit notice, all in a highly-visible and durable format. Wake action and weather have, in recent years, produced dramatic erosion along the shorelines of the narrows, exacerbated by the shallow water depth in that stretch. Swimmers, docks, nesting birds and fish are all put at risk by boaters who fail to watch and minimize their wake while passing through this lovely part of our lake.

On January 1st, 2022, Ontario introduced regulations requiring specific actions be taken to clean and drain watercraft when travelling overland. This regulation requires boaters to take reasonable precautions to remove any aquatic plants,

animals, or algae, and to drain all water from the bilge, livewell, etc. The new boat cleaning station makes it quick and easy for everyone to comply.

#### **Water Stewards**

On June 5th, about ten Chandos Lake volunteers met at the Glen Alda Community Centre for a Water Steward training session with Jeff Berthelette of the Invasive Species Awareness Program (ISAP).

He led us through a video demonstration of the detrimental impacts of invasive species on the ecosystem and local economy, and a hands-on demonstration of how to check a boat for invasive species hitchhikers.

Boaters and anglers are the #1 vector for spreading invasive species.

Our goal is to engage with boaters and anglers at the public boat launch to prevent the introduction of new invasive species into our lake. The aim is to educate them about the importance of Clean, Drain, Dry and Dispose and to encourage them to use the boat cleaning station.

Volunteers signed up for shifts that usually took place on weekends. Feedback from the Water Stewards and boaters was extremely positive and there was a noticeable increased use of the boat cleaning station when our Water Stewards were present.

#### **Chandos Lake Shoreland Protection Challenge**

Supporting a diverse shoreland area is one of the most important things that cottagers can do to foster lake health.

"Natural shoreland includes an area of native flowers, grasses, shrubs and trees extending back from the water's edge, as well as fallen trees, logs, rocks and plants below the water line." (FOCA)

Cottagers of all ages were invited to pick up a "Stewardship Bingo Card" from their local marina, mark the boxes describing things that they're already doing, and identify one or two things that they can begin doing in the future.

Participants were invited to enter a draw for a \$50.00 gift certificate at their favourite Chandos Lake marina. Congratulations to our 2023 winner, Indie Grieve, who picked Shantilly's Place as her favourite marina!

#### **Dip Netting For Kids**

Dip Netting For Kids offers children an opportunity to explore an exciting and very alive part of the natural world. Kids explore the shallow and swampy areas of the lake, searching for creatures with nets.

Many aquatic invertebrates live in the muck, including dragonfly nymphs and diving beetles, as well as creatures such as tadpoles and newts. This interactive science-based activity was a wonderful way to develop connection, curiosity, and a whole new understanding of shorelands.

Michelle Durst, a Trent University graduate with an Honours B.A. in Environmental and Resource Studies, led the program. She has been teaching outdoor education since 2012. She was excited to offer a program that combined three of her favourite things – water, bugs and mud!





# WEBINARS

Chandos Lake Property Owners Association (CLPOA) and Jack Lake Association (JLA) collaborated in the planning of four webinars over the summer season.

## CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR WILDLIFE ON THE LAKE

In this presentation, participants learned about challenges and opportunities facing wildlife on and around Chandos Lake and Jack's Lake. Professor Thom Luloff used engaging stories about real patients at the rehabilitation center to highlight risks to wildlife as well as ways we can enhance our coexistence with our wild neighbours.

#### **OUR DECLINING LOON POPULATION**

Canada's loon population is in decline. Two excellent speakers discussed the reasons behind this and what we can do about it. Dr. Doug Tozer, featured in the Cottage Life documentary "Loons: A Cry from the Mist", explained why the loon's productivity has declined across parts of southern Canada over the past few decades. He provided an overview of what the Canadian Lakes Loon Survey can tell us about the possible causes of the decline, along with a discussion on the steps we can take for conserving this impressive symbol of pristine wilderness. Margie Manthey was co-lead on Wolfe Lake Association's "Let's Get the Lead Out" initiative. the subject of her presentation. This project drew much needed attention to the problem of leadbased fishing tackle. The toxic lead tackles are eaten by loons and other large birds, who mistake the lead weights for pebbles (routinely eaten by loons to assist with digestion) causing their untimely death.

#### FIRST NATIONS TEACHINGS AND PERSPECTIVES

This webinar focussed on a brief history of the Mississauga Anishinaabe, an overview of archaeology within the Kawarthas, the community's relationship with archaeologists and the process of repatriation. Speaker and presenter Jack Hogarth, Cultural Archivist and Engagement Officer, Curve Lake First Nation Cultural Centre, shared the great value that he places on the education and traditional knowledge that has been passed on to him by countless Elders and Knowledge Holders throughout Turtle Island.

## OLD GROWTH FOREST IDENTIFICATION AND CONSERVATION

Presenter, Dr. Quinby, discussed the process of identifying Old Growth Forests around our lakes, the importance of conserving these forests and what we can do to preserve them for future generations. Dr. Quinby is an expert in identifying and measuring old growth forests.

#### **Climate Change at Chandos Lake**

In spite of what we may think, the Kawarthas are reasonably protected from the types of ravage that climate change currently inflicts on many other parts of the world.

We do not have major dam bursts that flood out entire communities; we do not have extremes of heat that account for many thousands of deaths; we do not have rising sea levels that force many people to relocate; we do not have really extreme weather events; and we have not (yet) experienced the ravages of major forest fires. And the unfortunate part of all this is that many of those people bearing the brunt of climate change are in less developed countries that are the least responsible for it.

But yes, climate change in less catastrophic forms continues to come to the Kawarthas, and yes, as global citizens we have an individual moral duty to do what we can to reduce our carbon footprint.



- A reduction in the number of days that there is ice cover on Chandos Lake.
- · Birds leaving later for their fall migration.
- · Summers becoming hotter and drier.
- · Tree species becoming more Carolinian and less Boreal.
- The maples will move further north and firs, spruce and pine will experience severe growth reduction.
- · The changing nature of lake algae.
- · More extreme weather events, particularly wind.

#### What will be some of the impacts of this change at Chandos Lake?

- · A reduction in winter activities such as snowmobiling.
- · Warmer lakes mean more and different kinds of algae, with a greater risk of toxic blue-green algae.
- · A reduction in cold water fish such as lake trout.
- Wide spread tree damage, such as the Derecho that hit Jack Lake in 2022.



#### **Dock Clean Up**

After a long discussion on possibly encouraging the practice of abandoning docks, the budget to remove abandoned docks was approved for this fall. A Saturday date in late August is still to be confirmed. More information will be provided in our regular CLPOA emails or Facebook group.

The approach will be the same as was done in 2017. Volunteers are needed to tow the docks to the boat launch area. All the heavy lifting into the disposal bin will be done by Armstrong Trucking. We still need several volunteers in the shallows to move the docks into position.

We are very grateful to the group that removed the rotting docks at both the beach and boat launch. All that Styrofoam was taken away safely before it too could escape under Highway 620.

Do not tow a dock to the beach launch without prior approval from the CLPOA.

#### **Crowe River Canoe Route Clean Up**

#### **Objectives**

 As much as possible, remove any garbage that has collected in the waters from the Highway 620 culverts and the Crowe River.

 Remove debris from the Crowe River, reducing the number of portages and allowing a faster and more pleasing paddle from Chandos Lake to Glen Alda.

Some Styrofoam remains in a few old docks stuck in the first low point created by an old beaver dam. At least one more dock can be found part way along into the Crowe River.

Pulling debris from the river usually requires standing in knee deep water or higher. As such, our work season is very short as we must wait for the water to warm up and the bugs to die down. The spring high water is very helpful getting to the Crowe River faster. Some years the water is high enough

for a light solo kayak to paddle over the three or four low points without having to step out of the boat, coming or going to the Crowe River.

Also, many of the logs in the Crowe River are below the surface. A light kayak should have no trouble sailing downstream, but a heavy canoe with two people will no doubt still have to bump over the sunken logs or step out to pull their boat around or over the obstruction.

Yet high water in some locations is a real barrier getting the necessary tools into position to work safely. For those locations, we have no choice but to wait until the fall, when the water level drops, to tackle those problems. Of course, by then the old beaver dams take more time to get over and there is just enough water to paddle over thousands of water lily

#### **Turtle Nest Protectors**

About 25 turtle nest protectors were installed in the spring and monitored daily in the fall for the last two seasons.

In 2022, two reports of hatchlings were submitted. They both made it to the water safely, one on each side of the culverts.

In 2023, lain found one hatchling in the boat launch parking lot that needed help to cover the last two meters.

Ralph Moore assisted a hatchling to safety but reported another two dead on the road.

Three hatchlings were found dead on Highway 620 this year.

With so few positive results these last two years, lain is no longer able to install and monitor the site on his own. Hopefully by May, another group of volunteers will have been found to help out. If not, we will have to allow nature to take its course.

#### **Chandos Lake Loons**



Since time began, or since 1980 when Reynold Caskey started keeping records, Chandos Lake residents and cottagers eagerly await the mid April ice out and the imminent return of the loons.

Seeing a newly hatched ball of brown fluff being fed by their attentive parents is an indescribable delight that must endure long after we are gone.

As fellow volunteers, please email lovechandoslake. clpoa@gmail.com or post your observations to our Facebook groups submitting the exact location of the very young chicks or the nest site.

In April and May, it is difficult to determine breeding pairs, but there is no harm in submitting your report of these adult loons. By late May or early June, a loon pair in your bay is most likely preparing the nest site if not already incubating their eggs.

It was disappointing that a couple of nesting sites in the main lake were not used and one site's eggs were washed into the lake. There is no doubt that this could be one of the several reasons why our count is in decline.

Please let us do what we can to stop or at least slow this trend.

- · LEAVE NATIVE WETLAND PLANTS that grow in wide strips along shorelines providing shelter for the small chicks.
- SLOW DOWN and minimize boat wakes to avoid washing out loon nests on the shoreline.
- · STAY WELL BACK from the young hatchlings who are vulnerable, especially during their first few days of life.
- · USE NON-TOXIC, NON-LEAD FISHING TACKLE to prevent lethal ingestion of lead by loons.
- DISPOSE OF FISHING LINES and GARBAGE properly to prevent waterfowl from becoming entangled and injured.

(It is so disappointing to find balls of waste fishing line routinely left in the boat launch area. If you find some, please dispose of it in the containers provided by North Kawartha).

## Rare Daytime Sighting of Coyote/Canid Pack

On January 25, 2024, I was thrilled to receive a call from Jill Dingwall to grab my camera to capture our first ever Coyote/Canid pack on the ice on the sunny side of Hemlock Point. I couldn't risk missing the shot, I quickly grabbed my housecoat, slipped into my boots and went outside.

Living full time on Chandos Lake since 2013, Edith and I have rarely seen a single Coyote/Canid. What a surprise to see four of them, not so far away that I needed the camera tripod but far enough that I felt safe on my neighbour's deck. The observation was reported to both MNR and iNaturalist.

I have used the term Coyote/Canid above to comply with the following:

"Where previous studies have noted the distinctiveness of eastern wolves from coyotes and grey wolves in Canada, the provincial government currently manages them as a single species across their primary range in central Ontario. This pooling of these three taxonomic entities for management is considered necessary because it is so difficult for humans to visually distinguish among wild Coyotes/Canids and their hybrids in central Ontario. Proper identification requires genetic data as it is difficult to visually distinguish due to its

similar appearance (coloration and markings) and overlap in size."

"Coyotes/Canids are usually wary of humans and avoid people whenever possible. If you encounter an aggressive Coyote/Canid, there are several things you should know and do: Never approach or touch a Coyote/Canid. Do not turn your back on, or run from, a Coyote/Canid. Back away from the Coyote/Canid while remaining calm. Stand tall, wave your hands and make lots of noise."



Apsley Minor Hockey Association Brings Home Three Championship Banners from International Silver Stick Finals!



Every fall, Haliburton hosts eight team division tournaments at the Under-11 (U11), Under-13 (U13), Under-15 (U15) and Under-18 (U18) House League/Local League levels. Each year, the Haliburton champions (and sometimes the finalists, if invited) qualify for the International HL/LL Silver Stick Finals in Pelham, Ontario. Apsley has had good showings at both the regional and international levels since they started competing in the tournaments in 2016.

In 2023-24, Apsley Minor Hockey made association history when three Apsley teams qualified for the International Silver Stick Finals in Pelham. Not only did Apsley send three teams, but all three teams came home champions!

The U11 Flames competed in the Haliburton Regional HL/LL Silver Stick Qualifier on November 18th and 19th. They won all three of their round robin games and advanced to the semi-finals. 



### **CLPOA Lake Markers**



The Chandos Lake Property Owners' Association (CLPOA) leads an important program dedicated to ensuring the safety of everyone who enjoys Chandos Lake.

We deploy distinct yellow buoys strategically across the water to indicate areas where caution is needed, such as hidden rocks and shallow spots. These buoys serve as crucial markers, guiding boaters away from potential dangers and towards safe navigation.

But our program is more than just placing buoys. It's a collective effort driven by a team of dedicated volunteers who meticulously install and remove over 100 buoys each year. This seasonal undertaking not only requires hard work but also demonstrates our unwavering commitment to maintaining a safe environment for all lake users.

These buoys are set out a service to the members of the CLPOA, to mark the hazards, but it should be noted that they complement but do not replace other tools available to the boater: the navigation chart(s) for the lake and your own knowledge and eyes on the lake. The CLPOA does not warranty or ensure the accuracy of each buoy location. While we do our best, with the assistance of GPS, to place the markers accurately in the spring, waves and wakes can dislodge or move the anchors. Reasonable care and judgement should be used in navigating rock shoals and



other marine hazards. Navigation on the lakes should not rely solely on these buoys. We would recommend that boaters stay 15 m away from any buoy.

In addition to buoy placement, our program emphasizes education and awareness. We've installed signage near narrow passages to remind boaters to be aware of the impacts of their boat, minimizing disruptive wakes that could endanger others or harm the environment. By promoting responsible boating practices, we aim to foster a culture of safety and mutual respect among all Chandos Lake enthusiasts.



Furthermore, our buoy program embodies a spirit of inclusivity and community engagement. Recognizing the invaluable contributions of private cottagers, we understand that no one knows the hazards in front of your property better than you. We extend an invitation for your active participation to adjust any marker that you may feel is out of optimal placement. By fostering a sense of shared ownership and responsibility for the lake's well-being, we hope to cultivate a vibrant and cohesive lakeside community bound by a common commitment to safety and stewardship. We also encourage all boaters and cottagers to retrieve any "wandering" buoys they see on the lake and advise the association where we can pick up the "lost" buoy. Strong winds and large wakes from boats may cause the buoy to become dislodged by snapping the rope holding the buoy in place.



I would like to thank our other volunteers; Paul DeMan, Jon Forbes, Ron Mayer, and Andrew O'Toole who helped with the buoys this year and of course the individual who maintains and repairs the buoys, lain Gorman. I would also like to thank Shantilly's Place for maintaining our boat, and giving us a home base to operate from this year.

# Three Steps to MORE STORM-TOLERANT TREES

The Derecho wind event of 2022 caused widespread tree damage throughout the entire Kawartha region. In the aftermath, many people wondered why some trees failed and others didn't. While predicting whether or not its effect on trees is not absolute, here are three steps that can help keep trees strong, healthy and more storm-tolerant.

#### **Plant Well**

If you are adding trees to your property, it is important to know that large strong trees come from small healthy trees. When it comes to planting, the most important place to start is with the right tree for the right location. Always consider the tree's characteristics and requirements as well as soil composition, soil moisture and available space for the tree to grow in. If any of these factors are missing, the health of that tree will be affected throughout its lifetime and the chance of failure in a storm increases dramatically.

#### **Prune Properly**

Whether you have young or established trees, pruning is necessary for trees throughout their lifespan. Young trees need a little help to establish healthy structure and branch spacing. This early pruning creates a strong form of well-attached limbs that are evenly spread out which will give it the strength it needs to combat winds. Mature trees should be pruned to remove dead, broken and rubbing limbs. The timely removal of these will help the tree focus energy on defending itself against pests and diseases and naturally strengthening its structure.

As a tree becomes larger, the force of wind, snow and ice can be too much. Reduction pruning is a technique used to lessen the spread of the canopy and limit the opportunity for branch and stem failure in storm situations. No matter what type of pruning is required, cuts must be made properly, if not they could cause decay that can severely weaken the structure of a tree. Proper tools and knowledge are necessary.

### **Promote Strong Roots**

While the first step to strong and healthy roots is starting with a healthy tree and planting it properly, maintaining that health throughout a tree's life is important and sometimes difficult. As trees get larger so do their root zones and construction, changing the soil depth, compaction, drought, overwatering, and even the sterility of a maintained lawn can cause a weakened and compromised root zone. Several techniques can be used such as fertilizing, protection during construction, root zone aeration and soil amending can help trees and their roots cope with a changing environment. A healthy root zone leads to a healthier and more stable tree.

Although this is a simplified list of what can make trees more tolerant to storms, it is a great road map to supporting stronger, healthier trees. The most important thing to remember is to be proactive and set your trees up for success!




### Canada Day Parade - 2023

Our swimmers often report loons appearing nearby keeping them company along the way.

Many swimmers, like Evelyn, find the challenge gets them swimming more than they otherwise have in the past. Her goal was to swim up until Labour Day and thanks to the wonderful weather at the end of summer, she swam well into September. A number of our swimmers, including Camp Chaos, were swimming in October.

The Swim Challenge is also used to train for other open water swimming events. Angle and Dianne, who are members of Swimmie Chicks, used their lake swims to

prepare for a 1.5 km and a 3.3 km race in Barbados in the fall. Bill started swimming late last summer and really took to it this year. He did a 2 km swim in September and a 4 km swim on Thanksgiving.

If you have been shy in the past to join, keep an eye out in June 2024 for details of how to sign up. If you are an early bird making waves in May, keep a record of the distance you swim, it can be included when the challenge starts.

If you have grandchildren or young children, you can register your cottage as a team. Pick a fun name that describes your group. When the

grandchildren arrive, tell them about the Swim Challenge

and request their help in increasing the cottage team swim distances.

It can be a great motivator for young swimmers, and it is an enjoyable way to spend time with the grandkids and get everyone in the lake swimming together.
